THE MANY DIMENSIONS OF COLLABORATION

In this feature section of the bulletin we take a moment to pause and explore some examples of effective collaboration that highlight the key ingredients that lead to success.

The UNSW-SJTU collaboration

UNSW Sydney has established a strong collaboration with the Shanghai Jiao Tong University (SJTU) of China. This collaboration is supported by a seed funding model that includes equal contributions from both institutions. One of the projects involves collaboration between the School of Public Health & Community Medicine, UNSW Sydney, and the School of Medicine at SJTU. The project focuses on two important areas: burnout in medical students and the re-development of an educational instrument to enhance the clinical collaborative skills of medical students, which could potentially reduce levels

of burnout. The research projects led to important findings around the high levels of burnout in medical students (Wang et al 2017) and the identification of important contextual differences that require re-design of educational instruments to suit specific contexts. A summary of this work will be submitted to ANZAHPE 2018.

While some significant research outcomes were achieved, the most important outcome was the building of inter-institutional links based on solid personal connections. The linking of key academics and the establishment of strong inter-personal links has laid the basis for a collaboration that is likely to stand the test of time.

International recognition for interprofessional collaboration

Avril Lee has received international recognition at the SingHealth Duke-NUS Education Conference in Singapore in September 2017. The conference took place at the Academia where collaborative learning across different teams and disciplines draws on the strengths and best practices of others and helps make new discoveries in medicine to advance patient care.

Avril and her colleagues in the Pharmacy and Medical Education Training Unit, won both the best oral and runner up presentation awards in the Stories category for designing and implementing collaborative practice programmes between Medicine and Pharmacy. The best oral presentation was awarded for Avril's work on the pharmacy buddy system to help international medical graduates transition more appropriately into prescribing in New Zealand. The presentation was called "Pharmacy Coaching for international medical graduates – a new paradigm in orientation". It outlined an approach to ensure this vulnerable staff group are equipped to prescribe safely in their new roles, using experienced clinical pharmacists as individualised coaches. This role includes building sustainable inter-professional relationships, creating a personalised welcome into a large organisation and sign-posting to local policies and prescribing support tools. She has demonstrated that this model of orientation is feasible and essential. In a time poor, modern, clinical environment investing in building relationships can save time and reduce delays in treatment and potentially patient harm.

The runner up award was for the presentation 'Medication safety option: interprofessional programme to improve junior medical staff transition'. This focussed on a 3-week attachment, designed by Avril aiming to help develop awareness and knowledge around the process of prescribing and medication safety. This includes inter-professional involvement and promotion of safe and

accurate prescribing. The option is designed to be interactive and clinically based on the learning outcomes of sixth year students' medical school core curriculum. The medical students are mainly based in the Pharmacy service and this collaborative model has increased both new doctors' and pharmacists' confidence to learn from each other and better understanding of the respective roles.

This work and the international recognition is has achieved, could inspire other pharmacists to engage in inter-professional medical education opportunities within their workplaces.

Exploring the functions of assessment driven ePortfolio - use in the context of vulnerable communities:

E-Portfolios are used across many disciplines as a teaching and learning tool and have become more social, more connected and easier to use. Students are asked to collect evidence in their E-Portfolios from people in vulnerable communities (e.g. children in school placements; patients in clinics, etc.). Asking for information that involves vulnerable groups as part of the assessment process may create challenges in terms of confidentiality, access to the information and consent. Additionally, it is unclear if there may be unintended outcomes when the information is uploaded in both text and other visual representations of vulnerable groups to an E-Portfolio. This collaborative project aims to collect information about the experiences of academics and students using an E-Portfolio and how the issues of privacy, consent and security are addressed. This project is led by Dr. Misty Kirby at Charles Sturt University.

Australasian University Health Clinics Collaborative

The Australasian University Health Clinics Collaborative is an active ANZAHPE HOT TOPIC ACTION GROUP (HTAG). The HTAG exemplifies important dimensions of inter-institutional and inter-professional collaboration.

Current activities of the HTAG include:

Research: A national exploration of allied health student and new graduate perception of University Clinic versus community and hospital based clinical educational experience.

Currently we have six universities interested in participating in the project, pending allocation of resources and ethics approval. They are: Canberra, SCU, Curtin, Edith Cowan, Murdoch, Griffith and RMIT and cover the disciplines of Speech Pathology, Physiotherapy, Occupational Therapy, Chiropractic, Dietetics, Exercise Physiology, Psychology, Counselling and

Podiatry. We are currently exploring Gant opportunities to cover costs of interview transcription and other expenses.

Possible ANZAHPE Conference Workshop: We are submitting an Abstract to conduct a half-day Workshop to discuss *Interprofessional Clinical Placements: Students' participation in health care delivery; educators' preparation and liability.*

Proposed study: We have submitted an application for a Grant to undertake a scoping study of Interprofessional Clinical Education activities in Australian and New Zealand University Health Clinics to inform the above workshop and other audiences.

Resources for UHCs: We are developing a suite of generic resources for organising student-led clinical services in UHCs. These will include suggestions for Policies that may be needed in the organisation and management of these clinical practicum experiences.

HSRAANZ Best PhD Student Paper Award

I was pleased to receive the Health Services Research Association Australia New Zealand (HSRAANZ) Award for the Best Paper by a PhD student at the HSRAANZ conference on 1st November 2017. This was for a paper entitled *Factors influencing* the perceived quality of clinical supervision of occupational therapists in a large

Australian State, published in the Australian Occupational Therapy Journal in 2016. This paper presents a state-wide study that investigated the factors that influenced high quality clinical supervision of occupational therapists in Queensland Health. The Manchester Clinical Supervision Scale (MCSS-26) and a customised survey were administered to 207 occupational therapists. Frequency of supervision sessions, choice of supervisor and type of supervision were found to have a positive and significant influence on the quality of clinical supervision. Age, length of supervision and area of practice were found to have a negative and significant influence on the quality of clinical supervision. Information from this study has been added to the Cunningham Centre clinical supervision training to enhance supervision practices of health professionals working in Queensland Health. This study was part of Priya's PhD on Factors that contribute to high quality clinical supervision in allied health. Further information about this award and paper can be found
